



#### **EARLY YEARS AND LOWER PRIMARY**

This academic year saw the arrival of three new members of staff, who quickly bonded with their classes and established a happy and settled atmosphere in each year group. Our major academic change was to introduce a phonics scheme called Phonics Shed and this has had a very powerful impact on reading, with a consistent, progressive scheme of beautiful reading books.

Phonics lessons are very focussed, fun and fast-paced. We introduced an assessment, every half term, of sounds and high frequency words, to better track and support the progress of all children as they learn to read.

All parents from Penguins, Owls and Robins were invited to observe phonics lessons, because where there is a culture of daily reading and discussion at home, children continue to thrive at school.











For the children, being safe at school is our number one priority and we have tirelessly worked at teaching, explaining and establishing how to treat each other with kindness and respect, how to play and include everyone and how to communicate clearly and politely. The behaviour in this department is now excellent and reflects not only the hard work from all of the teaching staff and monitors, but also the understanding of the children of how to be part of this community. We introduced fortnightly assemblies where we positively reinforce and reward those who have shown our school values in action. This term there have been awards for both responsibility and for communication skills.

#### **PRINCIPAL**

When considering the successes of the year, one has to be careful. Shine the spotlight in one place, and somewhere else is cast in the shadow. Furthermore, looking for headline stories is arguably not aligned with the nature of student learning itself, which is highly personal to the individual, and all about daily and often small incremental steps, but which together and over the course of a school year have a big cumulative effect.

I am pleased that this year, more than ever, we have lived the BCA values. Rather than remaining as just a nice poster on the wall, each term we have focussed on one value and seen it used as a driving force for educational experiences.



We are more connected than we have ever been to local organisations and initiatives. True, a step into the British system is a step out of the Andorran, Spanish or French systems, but our curriculum is enriched by the opportunities in Andorra and beyond: examples include numerous Primary school visits to events and places in Andorra, the *Dictat Nacional*, the *Consell dels Joves d'Andorra la Vella*, the RECcrea short film competition, the Science Congress, the Andorran schools chess championship and the activities of *Andorra Sostenible*, the official celebration of 30 years of UK-Andorra diplomatic relations, and many other charities in Andorra with whom we now regularly link for educational activities. We have a strong partnership with the University of Andorra and have welcomed a number of trainee teachers to complete their placements with- they universally speak favourably of the curriculum and teaching ethos at BCA.

We have launched our whole school House system (think 'Harry Potter'), with more developments around this to come next year, as we launch a representative House Council to further develop student leadership within the school. The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is firmly established (Year 10 and above). All schools must commit to a programme of education (and preferably action, too) for environmental sustainability, and it was great to have this important work recognised with our recent re-accreditation as an Escola Verda. Additional staff and newly created coordinator roles have added greater depth and specialised skills to the services we provide as a school.









We have faced challenges of course, not least in responding to the wider societal issues that have affected all schools this year, for example discussions around how schools should teach about sexual and gender diversity, how schools should assist families with issues of screen time and cyber bullying, and how schools should manage Al. To some of these questions we have set out a clear policy, for example aligning our PSHE curriculum with the English national curriculum, which sets very clear parameters and age guidelines for all topics, and a blanket ban on the use of phones on campus by children in Years 11 and below. In others, such as the incorporation of Al into teaching and learning, we are at an early stage but have made progress.

The school embarked on its IB journey over three years ago. It has been both a catalyst and a lever to effect curricular and extra-curricular developments throughout the school. Our aim is for our graduates, at age 18, to be bilingual and highly competent across the arts, humanities, sciences and mathematics. Next



school year we look forward to seeing our first graduating cohort, the 'Class of 2025', go forward as young adults to achieve their ambitions in higher education or employment, with much of the whole world open to them.

#### Transition Events, Friday 21st June

To support a smooth transition for the children into the next school year, and the class above, all children in the Early Years and Primary sections will have a one hour transition event on this day. They will meet their new teacher/s and complete some activities. With the exception of our new Nursery parents, who are invited to school on that morning, these transition events are arranged for the children only.

For Year 6 students transitioning into Year 7 and the beginning of Secondary school, the event will be four hours, including some lessons. We will provide additional written guidance for parents on supporting your child through this key transition.

On the same day, we will communicate to parents the name of the class teacher who has been assigned to each Early Years and Primary class next year.

Early in September, all parents will be invited to attend a 'Meet the Teacher' event to visit their child's classroom, meet the class teacher or form tutor, and hear about the plans and expectations for the year.

#### Minimising late arrivals and early departures

In the final weeks of this term, and when we begin next school year, we kindly ask parents to redouble their efforts to bring their child to school on time (medical appointments excepted).

Similarly we ask parents to minimise early pick-ups. Although the great majority of families follow the school hours, early pick ups are in general too frequent, especially on Friday afternoons, and wee need to collectively improve in this area. In the case that there is a good reason for an early pick up, we kindly ask for notification well in advance.

Please note the last day of the current school year is Friday 28th June, and is a full day of regular school with no early finish.
