Topic and Science Lab



Topic Work

In BCA, we have our own methodology based on the recognition that all students have different capacities and needs which must be addressed in the classroom. Therefore, our teachers plan their lessons with these differences in mind putting the learning within the extended grasp of the individual children who are the centre of all activities. Each class is seen as a workshop in which all children participate in a variety of ways receiving continuous encouragement and feedback on their learning journey.

The British College of Andorra prides itself on adopting a 'personalised learning' approach. What this means practically is that while the British National Curriculum objectives are worked towards, the talented teachers have autonomy to adapt the content and teaching strategies to the specific needs of our students. Our school planning is best described as 'personalised', 'creative', and 'forward thinking' as teachers provide the most stimulating and meaningful educational experience for the students in their care.

Each Primary Class has a Topic and each term or half term, classes change their Topic, so they can have different themes to be stimulated by. Activities from every area, sciences, humanities, languages, mathematics, the arts, are related to the same topic, to achieve a global knowledge and create openminded students.

Other benefits of learning through Topics are:

Cygnets

Cygnets have been learning vocabulary about 'Transport' and 'Professions' as they practise their phonics and their writing. This topic has linked to their maths' work also, counting cars and trucks. The Cygnets are really enjoying learning this term!





Penguins

Penguins' topic this half term is based on the book, Peter Rabbit. The children are enjoying outdoor learning with their own little vegetable garden and taking care of their carrots. They are also focusing on trying to use their phonics to make complete sentences when writing about Peter Rabbit's adventures.





Owls

Mancala is a famous African game. Traditionally, the game was played in the soil using seeds as counters. Children have to use their counting skills and think tactically before taking their turn. Owls' class have adapted this game to support their understanding of multiplication. In preparation, they made a colourful game boards using recycled egg boxes and chickpeas as counters.





Eagles

As part of their term long study of The Romans, Eagles' class has been investigating how the Roman made ink. It all started with a trip to the Science lab to see carbon being created. This carbon is then mixed with other ingredients to make their own version of the ink the Roman's would have used. They then made and wrote with their own quill pens.





Hawks

In Hawks' Class, children have been combining Maths and Science work connected to their topic about Egypt. First they learnt to convert measurements of length and then they measured their bodies. Using the scale 1:2 or 1:3, they divided their measurements. Finally, they created their own scale skeletons. This helped them to understand the bones of the human body.





Science Laboratory

Having a Science Laboratory at school has clear benefits for students, it helps develop scientific reasoning abilities and practical skills, as well as increasing understanding in science.

Learning takes place through experience and involves trial by error method and problem-solving skills.

Our Science Laboratory also helps develop teamwork. Collaboration enables students to creatively engage, communicate with others and develop leadership skills.

The role of laboratory practical work is to encourage active learning, critical thinking and a scientific based approach to learning.

Furthermore, we believe in 'learning by doing.' Our students have the experience of seeing Science come to life and this promotes a sense of life long interest and curiosity in Science.


What is your favourite city in the world?
