GLOBAL CITIZENS - LOCAL CITIZENS





Our <u>BCA Values</u> call for students to develop an appreciation of diversity, a sense of responsibility, a commitment to sustainability, along with self-awareness, compassion and communication skills. These all come together under the concept of citizenship.

Global citizens

We are working hard to develop global citizenship and intercultural understanding within the curriculum. The lead project is the introduction of the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) from September 2023. Preparations are well advanced: the teachers are in place and have been trained on specialist IB workshops, the curriculum is written, the resources have been purchased. We will host a 'verification visit' from the IB in March, after which we expect to be granted authorisation. Part of the IBDP is a compulsory programme of active service to the community, through which our students will make a positive difference locally and globally. In the Early Years and Primary curriculum, we also identify and promote opportunities to develop global citizenship.

You will read in this newsletter of our first participation in a student-led Model United Nations, where our senior students (and future leaders) recently engaged with serious global issues over two days of intense debate in Barcelona, along with several other schools.

There are many crises in the world: it is important as educators and parents that we help children to understand these, at an age-appropriate level, and provide both context and reassurance that there are solutions. In this newsletter you will read of how the Eagles have been sensitively including recent tragic events in Türkiye-Syria into their classroom learning. This week we are using the opportunity of Carnival to raise money to improve conditions for the people of Ukraine (a British Embassy initiative for schools), and for earthquake relief in Türkiye-Syria. Environmental protection and climate change mitigation is a global challenge, but one which is still relevant to our daily lives in Andorra. We know, for example, that 2022 was the warmest year in Andorra since 1950, and that the Andorra <u>warming trend is</u> <u>up and the snowfall trend is down</u>. Lifestyle changes are required of us all. Our work as an Escola Verda (Green School) continues, and BCA students have been invited to participate in a Green Schools Forum, in Andorra la Vella, during Environment Week in June. Our recycling initiatives continue and a school garden is planned for the Spring. Our Outdoor Learning programme teaches children that nature should be enjoyed, but not exploited.

Theresa May, former British Prime Minister, once declared that *"if you believe you are a citizen of the world, you are a citizen of nowhere"*. This unfortunately placed her out of step with more than half the world. A 2016 <u>GlobeScan poll</u> proposed the statement: *"I see myself more as a global citizen than a citizen of my own country"*. 51% was the global average of respondents who agreed with this statement; in Spain 59% agreed. Seven years have passed since that survey, and the global results may be different now: nationalism is on the rise, and borders and barriers to travel and trade are being strengthened rather than removed. Nonetheless, the concept of global citizenship is one that must endure and prosper.

Local citizens

We are also fostering our local connections and responsibilities.

Student teachers at the University of Andorra (UdA) must practise and develop their skills before they graduate, and many are interested in teaching in English and here at BCA. We have signed an agreement with UdA to mentor their student teachers, and one will start after half term, under the supervision of the BCA class teacher. We have also signed an agreement with the University to provide access for BCA students and staff to their physical and electronic library resources: this will prove invaluable for our Baccalaureate students next year, who will be able to access high level academic material to support their studies, along with what we have here in school.

Some of our Secondary students recently took part in the <u>16th edition of the National</u> <u>Dictat</u> organised by the Ministry of Culture and Sports, and next month students will join practical courses organised by the <u>Civil Protection</u>, in snow and avalanche safety. We have recently joined an initiative to establish a Consell de Joves (Youth Council) in Andorra, as one way of encouraging students to participate in the democratic process. Our Year 11 students will participate in the <u>Andorra-EU Barometer</u> project led by Andorra Research and Innovation, taking part in an opinion study in relation to the association agreement between Andorra and the European Union. Over the coming weeks we have a great number of field trips, for children in Early Years, Primary and Secondary, to museums, exhibitions and other events in Andorra. Our Adventure club in Secondary, new this year, is planning its first overnight hiking expedition into the mountains. Hawks and Peacocks will next month make a trip to the skiing World Cup finals here in Andorra.

This week we have been honoured to host a visit from the Head of Government and Education Minister, to demonstrate what we have achieved over the last five years, with their support, and our vision for the future. On Monday 13th March at 11:30 we will join with all schools in Andorra in simultaneously singing the national anthem, to mark the 30th anniversary of the Andorran constitution.

In participating in all these activities we recognise the learning opportunities and their potential to enhance our role, and contribution, as The British College of Andorra.

I wish all BCA students, parents and staff an enjoyable half term. The day we return, Monday 27th February, will be our 100th day of school this year: we are 100 days smarter than at the start of the year!

CONDORS




Year 7 have been honing their mathematical ninja skills

Learning and practising efficient ways of adding and subtracting mentally, using the fundamental laws of arithmetic. To get everyone thinking whilst practising the methods, they have been working in groups, standing at whiteboards on the walls to solve interesting problems and explore curious patterns.

In this particular lesson, in honour of the palindromic date 3/2/23, they were investigating palindromic numbers, and trying to establish which numbers up to 100, when added to their reverse, resulted in a palindrome (e.g. 23+32=55).

Later, they were challenged to make the largest and smallest possible differences when subtracting, without repeating the digits 1-9. To develop their mathematical communication skills, they were then invited to explain to the class what shortcuts or patterns they found to help them.





MODEL UNITED NATIONS CONFERENCE Y10 & Y11
